On March 13th we met as a leadership team and we decided to pause our programs in light of playing our part to ensure we flatten the curve on COVID-19. It was not an easy decision as we serve and care for some of the most vulnerable in our communities. Though we have had to close our doors in a physical sense, our staff and volunteers have remained engaged with the youth and families we work with as much as possible. This has looked different in every community. For some this has been staff creating short videos to post on social media. Others have been delivering food packages to families in need or activity boxes with crafts, games and a little treat! In some cases it has been staying in touch through video game platforms, phone or Zoom calls. We love and miss our youth dearly, but are so thankful that technology allows us to still be in contact with them from the safety of our own homes.

I am also excited to share with you that we are overwhelmed and humbled by the support and generosity of our financial partners during this time. Usually things are pretty lean through March and April, but this year we entered the spring in a relatively stable financial position. This, together with the incredible continued support of our partners through this time of financial uncertainty for many, has enabled us to continue honor our commitments and stay on top of our monthly expenses across the chapter.

As May rolled around, we would normally have been welcoming 400 or so of you to our Annual Dinner at Calvary Church. This year things looked a little different! There was no dinner and we did not gather in person, but we did have 400 people join us online for a "virtual" version of the fundraising event! Our team was so encouraged by all who attended, sent lovely notes and generous donations. We are so grateful to share that we surpassed our fundraising goal by raising a total of \$41,872. 

Ongoing Ministry Update

As you can imagine, each one of our eight satellite communities have been impacted by COVID-19 in different ways. As mentioned above, our staff in each satellite have done their best to remain connected with the youth, but as we move into the fourth month of this pandemic, we are really feeling the loss of face-toface connections. We have been praying and searching for new opportunities to reach youth at their core - their heart level - with the message of Jesus in this "new context". Our hope is to connect deeper during this physical distancing, and also be prepared to fully embrace outreach when we are able to re-open.

Here are a few things that are currently going on across our chapter:

 Four new youth are now attending online youth group activities at Auburn Bible Chapel after participating in a few online activities with our staff.

- Our team in Peterborough arranged and hosted an online Prayer & Fasting day as part of the Peterborough Youth Network, demonstrating church unity bringing families together to pray for our youth.
- The Bridge Youth Centre staff and volunteers have partnered with three community partners to start a food distribution program for families in Peterborough. The program provides food boxes that support families who would normally use the School Nutrition Programs for their children. After the first 4 weeks, they have seen 360 unique families access food through this program! This has opened doors for new relationships with schools, local agencies, and families.
- Two of our outreach workers created videos to share through social media to reach drop-in youth with the gospel. The Bancroft video has already had 620 hits!

- In Lakefield we had a great response to the Easter gift card campaign supporting youth and families from local schools and our programs.

As we head into the summer please pray for us as we plan and prepare for the reopening of public gatherings. We know that our current ways of doing outreach will need to be adapted and in some cases completely revamped. We also ask for prayer as we work to recruit more volunteers and look to fill four new staff positions to meet the needs once we start running at our usual capacity.

FEEDING YOUTH AND FAMILIES

At the beginning of May, we began a food distribution program at The Bridge Youth Centre which came together almost overnight. The "Feeding Youth and Families" project is a collaboration between Kawartha Food Share, Peterborough Youth Services and Food for Kids, which supplies the nutrition programs in all of the schools. The program is meant to serve youth and families who would have previously been accessing school nutrition programs, but is also open to any youth and families who need extra support at this time as we've all been affected by COVID-19. To date, we have been able to connect over 420 unique families and youth to fresh and non-perishable food through the program!



What is my role as a youth worker? Since this global pandemic began, I have continuously asked myself this question. What I have witnessed in the past couple of months has been eye-opening as I have gained a Since that first delivery, we have expanded our deliveries to 14 families, which is a total of 29 kids. We have been delivering packages bi-weekly to our Elementary and Junior youth families. The feedback from parents/ guardians and youth has been encouraging and very impactful.



new perspective as a youth worker. As the COVID-19 situation rapidly changed, I spent time thinking and praying about my role and how to help. I asked God for His vision on how I could help our youth and their families during this time. I am happy to share that during these two months, God has revealed more to me than I could have imagined.

The week immediately following March Break, I assembled and distributed care packages to seven of our elementary families. In the care packages were

food, craft supplies and a personalized birthday gift for each youth. Before the pandemic occurred, we had planned on throwing our annual 'Everybody Birthday' celebration following March Break. The parents sent us videos of their kids opening their gifts; it was very precious. At Youth Unlimited, we talk about the importance of caring for the whole person, sharing the Gospel and daring them to go deeper with God. During COVID-19, I have witnessed all three of these areas being lived out in a significant way. We have delivered care packages and maintained contact through phone and video calls, emails and our social media platforms. There have been many opportunities to share the hope and love of Jesus, encouraging them to discover God for themselves.

I recently told one of the parents, who is a single mom with four young kids, that if she needed me to do her grocery shopping, I would. She responded with, "I am crying." Those words were profound to me. They were a reminder that even if it doesn't look like much, the impact we make is huge! Even further, if those words could be so impactful, imagine hearing the truth about what Jesus did for us!


Although we are facing challenging circumstances God continues to show us that he is in control. We have been able to work together through online platforms to reach our youth in creative ways that are engaging and equipping. The platforms we have used include Zoom, Whatsapp, Jitsi Meet, Facebook and also through online gaming. Our hope for this summer is to continue to provide an online space for youth to connect with their peers, voice their struggles, dig deeper into their faith and perhaps for some even accept Jesus into their lives for the first time. Our partnership with Lakeside Church continues to be strong and effective. Through this partnership we are providing a Jr. Youth night on Wednesday's and a Sr. Youth night on Friday's. We have definitely seen the truth of this statement throughout the first half of 2020 at the Switch Yard. The theme of God providing for His work to be accomplished at and through the Switch Yard has come up over and over again this year, and we are very grateful! He has provided in a variety of ways including volunteers, finances and food.

For the few months we were able to be open in 2020, we saw God graciously provide food for our Thursday Night Drop-in meals. Right before Christmas we learned that due to Public Health regulations we could no longer accept home-cooked meals to feed the youth. This hit us hard, since this was something that we had done for many years, and because it is so necessary for so many of the youth who come to the Switch Yard. For many of them, it is the only home-cooked meal they have during the week, and guite possibly their only food that day. Thankfully, the Lord provided us with fresh ideas, and we reached out to local churches to provide grocery cards instead. This way we could purchase groceries and then cook the meals ourselves on site. The results were astounding - one church alone provided over \$600 in grocery cards in only one month!

The Lord also provided many wonderful volunteers for our annual Ladies Spa Night. Normally, it is a real struggle to find Hair Stylists who are available on a Sunday evening in February, but this year we were blessed with two! We were able to host almost 40 ladies from our community to pamper and bless them.

This event is a highlight of the year for many of these women because they come away feeling refreshed and valued.

Our March Breakfast Fundraiser was such an encouraging time of fellowship and celebration of what God is doing amongst the youth of Bancroft. We are so grateful for everyone who came out and supported the Switch Yard financially and prayerfully. We really saw the Lord's hand in this event since the attendance was much lower than expected, but we

still raised almost the budgeted amount! Praise God!

Then COVID-19 hit and we had to pause all programming. This means we have not seen our youth since before March Break! We miss them, and cannot wait to get back to seeing them on a weekly basis. In the meantime, we have been using this opportunity to plan and prepare for the future. We have tried to reach out to the youth through various physical distancing appropriate ways. One of these ways has been the creation of a meals program. Using grocery cards that we still had from the churches as mentioned above, we are able to purchase ingredients, and meals are prepared in a local certified kitchen. We then deliver them weekly to a few families that we know through the drop-in program. God continues to blow us away with His provision for this program, and it has been such a blessing to each of these families. We are so grateful for everyone who has played a part, and helped make this possible!

Another result of COVID-19 was that our biggest fundraiser of the year, our BBQ & Auction had to be cancelled. In its place we launched an online fundraising campaign for the month of June called 'Back on Track'.

The idea behind the name was that we have had to travel on separate 'tracks' from the youth during COVID-19, but we are looking forward to our 'tracks' merging back together soon with the message of the cross as the center. Since, we have all been in isolation, we believe the need for youth to have human contact and connection will be greater than ever when we are able to open again! We believe there will be a great opportunity to show that the youth are loved, adored and pursued by the Creator of the Universe - and that He wants to have a personal relationship with them!



I can remember standing in the Lakefield Legion the night of our Lakefield Youth Unlimited (LYU) Fundraising Dinner, back in late October 2019. I was physically shaking and going back and forth in my mind wondering if I was going to be brave enough to get up on stage and tell our guests what I had been doing since returning back to work from a sick leave. My heart was racing as the presentation portion of the evening drew closer. I had a back up plan; a pre-recorded video that I had completed earlier, but after reviewing it I knew it didn't capture the essence of what I wanted to say. Five minutes before it was to run I told Chris that I was going to go up on stage and share.

Vancouver. I asked her if she would give me permission to present this book to our local schools to see if I could do a 6-week presentation on coping with fear and anxiety, with students in grades 2-8 and call it "Courageous Kids". Meanwhile, the principal at St.



class in February 2020 but have had to pause due to the COVID-19 crisis.

This small children's book was about to change my life, and my hope was that it would do the same for other parents and their children who are affected by fear and anxiety. This book was like nothing I've seen in all my years of working with elementary students. It allows parents and their children to have a dialogue about their feelings in a very safe way. Children need to know that they matter and their feelings matter too.

MOM You need to understand that for the past 3 years I had E Z been dealing with the very topic that I was about to present. It came in the form of a children's book "Am I Safe?" by Tim Huff and Iona Snair. One of my coworkers told me that this book was for children and parents to read together to help initiate conversations about fear and anxiety. When this book landed on my lap I immediately gravitated to it and knew that I had to explore this further.

After getting a handle on the purpose of the book I spoke to Iona, as she too works for Youth Unlimited in

Paul Catholic School was very receptive and even said that I could come in and lead the sessions during their Religion period. So with the help of the author and a volunteer, Sarah Peacock, we were able to develop a curriculum to share with the students. Our first session ran in November 2019. We started teaching a 4/5 split

Not only does this book allow for conversations but also in our 6-week sessions we provide coping resources in the form of a 'courage kit'. In the classroom, after the students share with us what makes them anxious, we then empower them with helpful tools and resources to stomp those fears. Each week we add to their courage kits, such as breathing techniques and grounding exercises. Our hope is to dispel the fear and anxiety while building the students up to be a "Courageous Kid"!

INTERVIEW

We are very thankful to Anne Orsi, our Volunteer Jr. High Outreach Worker, for all the time and care she gave to the students at Lakefield Youth Unlimited. Anne's studies have drawn to a close for this school year and so her time at LYU has come to an end for now.

QUESTION: Name some encouraging events that happened as you led the Thursday night LYU Jr. High Gym Nights this past year?

ANNE:

- A Jewish boy asked for prayer for healing over his ankle. At first he did not participate in the God Talks, but then began to take part in them.
- A boy shared that he received dreams and visions from the Lord and knows Him personally. My hope was to engage him in evangelism within the Gym Night program.
- A lead volunteer started with us last year, and was not a Christian. She is now seriously counting the cost and is wrestling with the lifestyle changes that would be needed to follow Christ.
- One girl asked for prayer for her shoulder and got healed. She is from a family that practices Wiccan.

QUESTION: In the winter of 2020 you, and some of our LYU staff, volunteered to provide recess support at one of our local elementary schools. Was this time beneficial?



ANNE:

- · During one recess a boy was crying because of social and economic challenges in his life. We were able to comfort him by sharing how much God cared for him.
- Our presence was able to reduce the amount of negative issues happening in the schoolyard. The teachers commented that our presence was impactful. We knew that it was because we were praying as we walked around and that Jesus' presence with us was having the most influence.
- We enjoyed offering friendship and playing games like hopscotch, four square and tag with students that didn't usually have friends and were feeling left out.
