BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS ON AND OFF THE COURT

You may wonder why Compass is such a pivotal program for YFC London. Can basketball really be used as a ministry? The answer is a resounding yes! In fact, it was created for that very reason.

Often, the boys that are a part of our Compass ministry have never had the opportunity to play basketball or any organized team sport before. This new responsibility means being on time and honouring the promise they made to their team. This level of commitment is often new for both the players and their families. It creates a change in attitude and brings about a level of responsibility.

It is so rewarding to develop trust and respect with the players as the season progresses. This leads to questions about faith and confessions about struggles. Sometimes, the fruit of these conversations is not seen for years to come but this ministry is planting seeds.

It's not just the Compass boys that are impacted. Relationships are developed with parents and families and meaningful conversations are happening both on and off the court. There's a level of trust and parents will open up about their own struggles. What a blessing to be able to share God's love with them as well as their son.

SUMMER TRAINING CAMPS

This summer we had training camps for grade 8 and grade 9 boys. These week-long sessions focused on honing their skills while playing with integrity.



MUSKOKA WOODS

Each year, Muskoka Woods donates a week of camp to non-profit organizations. We are so grateful for the opportunity to take a group for a week of outdoor fun. During their stay, the guys participate in regular camp activities - canoeing, high ropes, and paint ball. as well as "team meetings" when we have a devotional or share a testimony. Our trip to Muskoka Woods allows us to go a bit deeper as there is an intentional faith component built into the week.

Basketball was invented by Canadian James Naismith while attending a YMCA college in Springfield, Massachusetts. While some of you trivia buffs might be familiar with that nugget, you might not be aware of the sport's connection to faith.

You see, Naismith was attending Springfield College to become a missionary. The International YMCA Training School was a pioneer in "muscular Christianity" integrating prayer, Bible study and athletics. Naismith discovered that his passion for sports helped him connect with young people when he shared the gospel with them.

While there, Naismith was tasked with creating a sport that could be played indoors during the winter and that could be used to tell people about God. And, that's when basketball was born. Naismith created the game to use as a missionary tool and each of the original 13 rules were linked to faith. In fact, one of the reasons basketball is a global sport today is because it was taken around the world by missionaries.

AWAY COMPETITIONS

Our teams competed in Michigan and Indiana, bringing home a trophy from Indiana! These trips give the boys an opportunity to compete on a higher level, helping them develop their skills. It is a boost to their self confidence. knowing they earned a spot at this level of competition.
